

Strategies for Decoding Unknown Words: when you are reading and you come across a word you don't know try to use one of these strategies to help you figure out what the word is!

Word Attack Strategies

Reader:	Room:		
STOP	Stop if something doesn't look right, sound right, or make sense.		
—	Reread: Go back and try again.		
P	Say the first letter sound.		
pl	Blend: Say the first two letters.		
plan man	Think of a word that looks the same and rhymes .		
plan	Chunk: Look for parts you know.		
an	Cover part of the word.		
aeiou	Try a different sound for the vowel.		
٠.	Context: Ask "What word would make sense here?"		
\bigcirc	Read to the end of the sentence and come back.		

Comprehension questions to ask while you are reading fiction and non-fiction texts this summer!
*Important skills include summarizing, and finding the main idea.



Help your child become a better READER

Questions to ask your child while reading fiction text.

- -Who is the main character?
- -What is the setting in the story? Does the setting change?
- -What was the problem in the story and how was it solved?
- -Did the character change during the story? How?
- -How are you like the main character? How are you different?
- -What do you predict will happen next in the story?
- -Why do you think the author chose this title for the story?
- -Do you like the title of the story? Why or why not?
 -Can you think of a different title for the story?
- -Which character from the story would you choose to be your friend? Why?
- -Which part of the story was the most exciting? Why?
- -Did you like the end of the story? Why or why not?
- -Which parts in the story could really happen? Which parts could not really happen?

Materials: Match the Array cards




- 1. Work with a partner. Place the cards facedown on the table.

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
Base Ten Concentration

- 5. Keep taking turns until all pairs of cards have been found.







